KSA Member Spotlight

This month's spotlight shines on new KSA member Mitch Barrett. I was born and still live in a holler just outside of Berea KY that my Great Grandfather settled in. I come from a family of storytellers (not professionals but the men and the women are all blessed with the gift of gab). I grew up with lots of music and storytelling in my home. Most of it was centered on work. My Pa raised tobacco, so there was a lot of time spent as a child working with him and the elders of my family and community, in the field and tobacco barn stripping room. After my Grandfather, Raymond "Bunk" Gay died, the fox hunting magazine "Sounder" did a story on his storytelling abilities. We grandchildren knew that he made up tales for us, but had no idea he was famous for his storytelling around the fox hunting community here in Kentucky. I recon I come by it naturally. I am a father of four wonderful children and I have made a living singing and telling stories for thirty years now. I travel a lot but Kentucky is my home and I love it here. I have worked with the KY Arts Council in schools throughout the state for 20 years or so. I am proud to be a member of the Kentucky Storytelling Association.

Why did you join KSA?

Mary Hamilton told about KSA, I joined because in my travels I would hear all these tellers from other states, and wanted to be a part of the network of tellers here in my home state.

What so far have you liked about being a member of KSA?

I like networking with other tellers.

What kind of stories do you enjoy?

I love traditional tales, but my favorite stories are just real life stories from folks I meet.

How has your life been affected by stories from family or friends?

The stories my Grandparents told over and over again have helped shape me and give me such a sense of place. I try to share those old stories, and create new ones with my children. The thing I like the most about storytelling is how a good tale can take you away from the anxiety and stress of everyday life. It goes without saying how important family stories are for preserving our culture and history. I love telling and hearing good stories.

Storytelling in Foreign Lands

I recently went to Buenos Aires, Argentina, to story tell for school children on a four week tour. Dream On Productions found me through my website and last August, 2009, I received an email inquiry from them. They offered me a four week tour which I accepted, and after some months of preparation and exchange of information, I left on June 5 for my storytelling adventure! Dream On hires storytellers from different English-speaking countries, such as England, the United States, Australia and New Zealand. They place storytellers in one of seven countries and they do a very good job in terms of planning, organizing and managing the tour. The tour schedule is matched to the best seasonal time for schools in South America, which often is in October or May/June.

I happen to have a decent knowledge base of Spanish and, although not strictly necessary for the tour, it was very helpful in both my free time and for the performance feedback loop. That is, if I heard a child identify a word or phrase in English by defining it aloud in Spanish, then I knew that some of the student audience was keeping up with the story.

I enjoyed the challenge of storytelling to an audience of children age five to 18 years of age who were on the road to English (as a second language) competency. Some of the schools were bilingual or trilingual, and other schools simply had classes in English. Each day I'd leave my apartment to find the regular taxi driver and my tour manager waiting. Buenos Aires and area has some 13 million inhabitants and with this large city some of our taxi rides to the school easily took 45 minutes to an hour. Ariel was our reliable and safe driver and Alberto was the tour manager. Alberto, who is also the owner and head of Dream On, was great with managing every detail, scheduling, getting me my daily lunch and trouble shooting language and logistical situations. Although my schedule was busy (I did 60 performances in four weeks), I had time to enjoy later afternoons, touring museums and craft shows and more ambitious weekend side trips. I went on a four-hour one-way bus ride to Rosario, I took a plane to the north of Argentina near the Brazilian border, to tour Iquazu Falls and a crystal mine, and I took a ferryboat across the Rio de la Plata to Colonia, Uruguay.

So grateful for this unique opportunity, I did my best to stretch into some of the nuances of Argentine Spanish, culture, World Cup soccer madness and of course the wonderful personal connections made at each school with students and teachers.

I think I usually feel to be a solo performer working diligently but fairly alone in my field. The experience I had storytelling in Buenos Aires gave me a very real sense of being part of a team, and that support was both practical and helpful in terms of the energy I needed to do a good job and connect with the children.
