Hello KSA Members,

Kentucky Storytelling Month – the entire month of September – will be here soon! Now that KSA has succeeded in having Governor Beshear proclaim an entire month in honor of storytelling, let's all join together to see what we can do to increase opportunities for storytelling throughout September. Wandering Storytellers in Lexington, Kentucky Homefront Radio Show, Tale Talk and The Moth in Louisville, all monthly events, will be happening as usual. The Tilghman Tellers, Paducah Tilghman High School's storytelling troupe, will be entertaining children at local elementary schools the week of September 14 – 18. Paul Sawyier Public Library in Frankfort is planning the 2nd Kentucky Liars Contest. In Morehead the Cave Run Storytelling Festival brings storytelling to thousands of area school students and to the general public the last weekend in September. In mid-September the Haunting in the Hills Festival at the Big South Fork National River and Recreation area, an area that straddles the KY-TN border, sends storytellers to schools in surrounding counties including McCreary and Wayne Counties in Kentucky. In addition McCreary County Public Library will host a Kentucky Folklife Master/Apprentice Program display that features storyteller Octavia Sexton during the month of September.

Workshops

The presenters have been chosen! A mighty big THANKS goes to the proposal reading committee of Maryann Zoll, Steve Lanham, Delinda Dent, and Betsy Fleischer. They had 20 proposals to read and decide upon. The lineup is as follows:

Joanna Demarest – "The Character's Perspective; Creating Characters with Panache!" Come and play with your voice, posture, movement, and language to create more interesting and dynamic characters

Pat Nease - "Games Storytellers Play"

Non-threatening, laughter-filled games hone listening, speaking, voice, empathy, creativity, presentation, and imagination skills and accommodate a variety of ability levels, ages and group sizes. (double session)

Octavia Sexton - "Sharing the Magic"

Participants will learn how to use storytelling to inspire and guide students in the creative process of writing, dramatizing or telling a story in a participatory workshop. (double session)

Brian Jones – "Preserving Personal History: Telling the Story of Terminally III Patients" This workshop will explore various methods to preserve a patient's story.

Addie Hirschten - "The Purpose Driven Story"

Give your story direction by defining your root message. In this workshop we will dissect messages and morals to reach the heart of storytelling.

Saundra Kelley - "Build a Better Guild"

The ex-president of the Jonesborough Storytelling Guild shares the evolution and tools needed to build a guild. Participants will leave with concrete ideas and visions to take home.

Loren Niemi - "Is the Ghost Story Dead?"

This workshop will explore the telling of nontraditional and/or psychologically disturbing stories, as well as looking at reanimating the shadowy core of traditional stories. Learn the how and why of balancing really creepy content with audience pleasing wit and disarming charm in a well-told story.

Otto and Katie Ross - "Invitation to Participation!"

In this interactive and fun workshop let the Rosses inspire you with tried and true ways to get your audience members participating in your presentations.

Janice M. Del Negro – Word-Smithing; the Practical Construction of Effective Narrative Language"

Focus on practical tools that encourage storytellers at all levels to find their own joyous way through the stories they are called to tell. (double session)

Volunteers

Yes, folks. It's that time of year again. Your conference chair is trolling for volunteers. There are various jobs for all. The goal for conference volunteerism is: one and done! How can you help row the conference boat to keep it afloat?? You can:

Put up outside direction signs.

Set up three workshop rooms – set out easels and markers, evaluations box, and sign-in sheets. Work the registration table - welcome and give out folders, and receipts if necessary, for Friday night, or on Saturday morning 8-9:15 a.m.

Be a timekeeper - for open mic times on Saturday, or for the late night story slam on Friday night 8:45-10:00 p.m.

Be a judge – need three for the Slam – all you have to do is listen, enjoy, and hold up a number. Be a score recorder for the Slam – skills needed are simple math and legibility. Be the "official" photographer for the conference Friday or Saturday or both. Be the Story Store Manager – the one in charge of the store, need math skills, accuracy in filling out inventory forms, work with clerk.

Be a clerk at the Story Store when it is open – need math skills, pick a shift.

Be the Emcee for Saturday - you will have a script from which to read.

Be the Emcee for Friday night concert.

Be the Emcee for Saturday night concert.

Be the Room Monitor Chair – be in charge of recruiting and scheduling room monitors.

Room Monitors help the presenter set up if needed, announce at the beginning of the session about the sign-in sheet and evaluations to be done at the end, arrange with the presenter the signal for 5 minutes left, hand out evaluations and collect, instructions for evaluations will be on the evaluation red box.

Be the Door Prize Chair – solicit story related prizes to create 7 giveaways, set up the prize table, pick a name from basket and give to the Emcee, retrieve name slip.

Be the CEU credit procurer, print out sign-in sheets and documents for CEU and PD. Help with take down on Saturday night.

It takes several, several people to put on your conference and your help can make it fantastic! Increasing Costs; Increasing Dues by Mary Hamilton

One responsibility of your KSA Board is to guard and maintain the financial health of KSA while also working to keep KSA accessible to all economically. To that end, your KSA Board has recently decided to increase KSA dues. KSA dues had never been changed in the last ten years. And yet, basic expenses have been changing. For example, the KSA P.O. Box rental that cost \$70 in 2005 will cost \$164 in 2016. And all of us know how much postage has been rising, so even though KSA, like all other organizations, has steadily increased its use of email, there is still a need for postage. Your KSA dues increase is not huge, just \$5.00 in most dues categories and no increase for students. Here are the new KSA dues rates: Students \$15; Elders (over 65) \$20; Individuals \$25; Families (all members living in same household or supported by the family while away at school) \$50; Organizations \$60. While the number of members has risen over the years, the money from dues has still not kept up with administrative expenses.

All KSA members will continue to receive substantial discounts on Kentucky Storytelling Conference pre-registrations. In 2015 KSA member pre-registration will be \$55 for Individuals and \$110 for Families as compared with Non-member pre-registration rates of \$75 for Individuals and \$190 for Families. As in the past, KSA's Organization/Institution Members can authorize Conference preregistrations for individuals affiliated with their organization at KSA Individual Member pre-registration rates. Conference "at the door rates" for 2015 will be \$80.00 for individuals, and \$200 for families.

Spotlight On Kentucky Youth Storytelling by Russ Conrad

Each year Kentucky Storytelling Association sponsors the Kentucky Youth Storytelling competition, a statewide effort to develop, encourage, and highlight the talent of our young storytellers. From this competition each year, up to five Torchbearers are selected from entries across our state.

This year we had fifteen entries and the five new Torchbearers for Kentucky Storytelling Association are: Chloe Esmeier of Lakeside Park, Cameron Arnold of Bowling Green, Andy Peeples of Philpot, Sarah Hardy of Alamo, and a tandem team: Brad and Alec Delaney from Louisville. Note the spread of communities and recognize this is a state-wide competition.

The chairman of the KY Youth Storytelling Committee, Gwenda Johnson, prepared forms and solicited entries through many avenues, all across our Bluegrass State, including schools, libraries and Extension Service. Each entrant provided a DVD video of them performing a story. Some of the stories were new material written by the entrant. There were some stories told that were written by other storytellers and credit was given to the original author.

Some of the Youth Storytellers used parodies of old children's stories such as Little Red Riding Hood. The parodies can be quite entertaining. This year the entries exhibited a wide variety of storytelling methods and talents.

Mary Hamilton and Russ Conrad were the volunteer judges for the day. We met Gwenda at the Nicholas County Extension Office in Carlisle. It was very kind of this office to allow us to use a room that was a central travel point to our group for the day. The screening process requires that we view each video, discuss the performance a bit and then individually score each entry. Each judge also wrote notes to every entrant advising as to what was done well in their performance and to provide information as to how to improve the story and its telling.

Each Torchbearer receives a plaque commemorating their accomplishment and is awarded a \$100.00 cash prize. They are provided a free one year membership to Kentucky Storytelling Association and invited to our Annual Conference with an opportunity to share a story during that conference.

The Torchbearer title also opens the door to other telling experiences. The winners will be invited to tell a story at Storytelling In The Mountains, a much anticipated annual spring event in Harlan, KY. Most years these students will also have the privilege to tell a story at the Kentucky State Fair in August.

As KSA members, each of us have friends and acquaintances that we should invite to participate in the next Kentucky Youth Storytelling competition. Please pass this information along to your young friends as well as their parents, teachers and mentors.

Thank you Gwenda for organizing and managing the 2015 competition. Thank you Mary for volunteering as a judge for this day.

Note to all KSA members: "You will enjoy working with this Youth Storytelling Committee. Volunteer as a committee member or as a judge for 2016. You will be rewarded!"
