Fellow KSA members, I'm looking forward to a great time this year as we travel together on our storytelling journey.

I am so thrilled with the board that we have assembled and I am looking forward to their contributions to KSA in 2016. We have a great mix of new and long-time KSA members on the board. I also thank you, the members of KSA, for continuing to support the art of oral storytelling through our organization.

In this coming year, we as a board will continue to build on the legacy of those who started KSA in 2004. One of the highlights of our year is our annual conference scheduled for early November. We'll have more details on that later, but you can expect a call for proposals soon. If you'd like to share your experience and wisdom with the rest of us, this is an excellent opportunity to do so.

We will also continue Wandering Storytellers, which meets monthly at the downtown branch of the Lexington Public Library. We will be tweaking the format a little bit. One change that excites me is the introduction of up to 3 Story Labs during Wandering Storytellers in 2016. These labs will give us the opportunity to experiment with our stories and to receive feedback from fellow tellers, which, in turn, can help us take our stories to the next level.

We will continue to have a presence in storytelling throughout Kentucky in 2016. We will again petition the governor to declare September as Storytelling Month and we hope to have Storytelling in the Mountains again in Harlan. We have also been asked to host a Story Slam at the Cave Run Storytelling

Festival near Morehead. And we will continue to nurture young, emerging storytellers through our Youth Storytelling program.

In 2016, we will also be looking ahead as we work on our strategic plan that will lead to even more success in the future. We will prioritize our list of goals, strategies, and tactics and develop an action plan for the next 3-5 years and beyond.

We went back to Dale Hollow Lake State Resort Park. They like us there. We had 50 pre-registered folks and 10 presenters this year including six public librarians from the local area and some walk-ins. The evening concerts were enjoyed by all and our Torchbearers came and told. What a pleasure to hear those young tellers. The story store was packed with such a variety of books, CDs, and art that there was something for everyone. Again we were graced with wonderful interpreters for the deaf who enjoyed themselves a lot. All of the workshops were well attended. The evaluations were overwhelmingly positive so a great big THANK YOU goes out to all of the volunteers who pitched in to create a welcoming and wonderful conference!!! Without all of you there couldn't be a conference (cue the applause). We had a 53% return on the conference evaluations -- the highest percentage to date!

Our partnership with the park was helpful to both parties. They helped pay for the featured teller, Pat Nease, AND provided lodging for the interpreters. That arrangement really lessened our expenses and gave us that gorgeous vista from the hallway. Dale Hollow was able to offer the evening storytelling concerts free to the public as a park event. Yet again, we also partnered with our very first and continuing partner -- the Knowledge Center on Deafness who provided us with the interpreters and covered expenses for one. Everyone received information on what interpreters do and how to use an interpreter.

The main comment on how to improve the conference is "more time" for workshops. This year we did morning double-session for workshops and the rest of the day was single session workshops. To get more time in workshops we could offer fewer workshops, or with more participants look into a two day conference which we have discussed. At this time we do not have the financial resources to stage two days of workshops. That is a goal.

New this year was "Board on the Bench". Board members took turns sitting on the bench outside the main meeting room at specific and announced times to talk with any and all. People used the opportunity. It was really good to talk to folks, answer questions, and take suggestions. We will be keeping this activity in future conferences. Thank you to all who participated.



#### **KYS Changes**

New for the 2016 Kentucky Youth Storytelling Contest

- Entrants may be as young as seven.
- Story lengths may range from 4 10 minutes.
- Entries may be submitted via electronic link or mailed DVD.
- A scoring rubric has been created to make it easier for KYS judges to provide feedback to entrants so storytellers can learn where their skills are and what they can improve.
- Storytelling tips, written to correlate with the scoring rubric, provide advice for young storytellers and help for adults who assist youth tellers.
