Pam Holcomb's legacy lives on in the storytelling realm of Kentucky.

KSA has received a \$1,000 gift in memory of Holcomb, who died Oct. 31. That money has been earmarked for the Kentucky Youth Sto- Lowry fondly recalls her as a "dear rytelling (KYS) Program.

North Carolina storyteller and Harlan, Kentucky native Tim Lowry made an appeal for donations in Holcomb's name during his December tour of Charles Dickens' "A Christmas Carol."

"It was my hope that I could collect a \$1 here and \$5 there and make a small contribution toward this excellent program. Wow! The Christmas Spirit (past, present, and future) is alive in the hearts of my audience," Lowry said on Facebook.

told was a wonder to behold," especially how she created effective and believable characters.

"I loved to hear Pam do the Brer Rabbit stories," KSA member **Gwenda Johnson** agreed, adding "but she told her mountain (and) coal mining stories with much more passion."

Johnson first encountered Holcomb after Holcomb got lost traveling to Sandy Hook for a storytelling workshop. The two began talking after the training and "when she left, I knew I had a lifelong friend. It seemed we had known each other forever."

Johnson described Holcomb as "a mountain woman, strong and determined. Witty, truthful, passionate toward her faith and family. A true friend."

Holcomb did a great job of adjusting her style to the type of story she was telling, Hamilton said. "When she told a humorous story, it was truly funny. When she told a ghost story, it was properly eerie."

What Johnson liked about Holcomb's storytelling style was that "she told stories without a lot of theatrics. She used her voice, body language, (and) facial expressions to emphasize her main thought."

But what Johnson really enjoyed about Holcomb stories was that she told them "as if she lived them. And some she did. She made the listener feel they were a part of the story. They lived them with her."

Holcomb also portrayed the mother of a Civil War soldier in a tandem story that she told with Georgetown story-

teller **Bill Watson**. He said that the story needed a woman's voice and, after talking it over, Pam agreed to team up on the story.

They told the story across Kentucky and it was widely acclaimed as one of the best stories told during the 150th anniversary of the Civil War a couple of years ago. In fact, the duo was

scheduled to tell that story two weeks before Holcomb died, Watson said.

He added that Holcomb "was always encouraging to me as well as a mentor for my own storytelling."

Holcomb was actively involved in KSA, serving as president, treasurer, and quadrant director over the years. She also coordinated the Storytelling in the Mountains event in Harlan County as a fund-raising event for KSA.

While there's no doubt that she told stories all her life, her life as a professional teller took off after she retired from nearly 30 years of teaching high school math and drama. When she

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retired, she was quickly accepted for positions on the Arts Education and Performing Artists rosters managed by the Kentucky Arts Council.

As a retired teacher, Holcomb never lost her love of helping young people achieve. She was actively involved in the Kentucky Youth Storytelling program and chaired it for several years.

"Her years as a teacher came into play in our relationship," Watson said. "She taught me about storytelling."

Hamilton said what she remembered most about Holcomb was "her laughter, her smile, and her tolerance and patience for seemingly everyone."

Johnson had similar recollections. "Pam was genuine, always the same. I remember her smile, her personality.... She never made anyone feel insignificant. She was a caring person."

Holcomb will be remembered differently in different circles, Johnson said. "The Christian Storytellers ... will remember her as spreading the word of God through Storytelling. That would please her."

Others will remember her as an Appalachian storyteller Johnson added. "She would be the same on stage as she would sitting on the front porch or under the shade tree swapping stories," she said.

"I miss her every day," Johnson continued. "Never have I met anyone that had a bigger impact on me personally or professionally than Pam Holcomb. To me she is bigger than life. I will forever call on her spirit to enter the room and support me as a storyteller."

Watson summed it up this way:
"There was only one Pam Holcomb ...
and there won't be another like her."
